Drill is taught like any class. It requires preparation and like any class, it requires a lesson plan. A drill lesson requires a little more preparation. Completing a lesson plan will benefit any training plan. The first thing you must do is to get a copy of the Drill references; most corps have a copy of the Canadian Forces Drill Manual CFP 201 or the NL Drill Manual. Once you have your references you must find what topic that you have been asked to teach. Now that you have become familiar with the drill movement, (practice if necessary) you are ready to get started on your lesson plan.

Before starting your lesson plan you must remember that it must be easy to understand. This is important so that someone else can teach your lesson.

SUBJECT

The first thing that you must write down is the subject because your reader must know what the class is that s/he is teaching.

LEVEL

Next you must write down the course level and instructor. This is needed to tell the reader who he is going to teach and who wrote the lesson plan so that s/he may ask them questions.

TIME OF CLASS

Next, the time allotted for the class. This gives the person an idea of the length of the lesson.

TRAINING AIDS REQUIRED

Next you must list what training aids are required. This is important so that s/he can prepare the training aids.

REFERENCES

List references used to instruct this class, have them on hand if possible.

ENVIRONMENT

The next important aspect is the environment. This is where the class is held, in the classroom, or on the deck

EXAM OR REVIEW

Last, what type of exam is there to be; i.e. oral, written, and/or practical.

INTRODUCTION

Now we proceed to the body of the lesson plan. First you must give an introduction. This tells the reader and the cadets the purpose of the drill lesson and the standard to be taught.

AIM

Next you must give the aim of the lesson. This informs them as to what they will accomplish by the end of the lesson.

MOTIVATION

Now you must give the motivation for this lesson. We need this to give them incentive to learn the lesson.

ORGANIZATION

Now we have the organization of the lesson. This section gives the reader an idea of the movement and something to read in preparation for the actual class.

PERFORMANCE CHECK

Next is the performance check. This can be a practical group or individual assessment of the cadets. In this part of the lesson plan you must give your drill commands individually, collectively and individually again. This requires a lot of practice with the cadets.

CONCLUSION

The final part of a drill lesson plan is the Conclusion and Review.
